Sadly, I feel the national discourse has for too long focused on the "other". It is a common theme across our globalized western democracies that people who are different to us, who stand outside our circle, are largely responsible for a lot of our pressures and woes.

Of Mud & Men – Paddy goes to Glastonbury



Let me be clear - I do not like queues, I dislike crap food and I border on sociopathic when it comes to crowds and cramped spaces. What I do like is music. I love music. However, until this vear I had not attended that mecca of the music world – Glastonbury. It is arguably the biggest, most diverse festival of popular music on the planet.

With a lot of encouragement from my good friend and veteran of 15 Glasto's Scott (of evanjack fame thanks for coming to our incredibly successful gig everyone) I was convinced to give the festival a try.

Leaving London for Worthy Farm in Somerset on a sunny Tuesday, Scott and I formed the advance party. Our job was to ensure a sweet set up for the others that were joining us. Asides from the camping gear and supplies we had one or two beers to carry in as well. 54! It was hard graft but satisfying work in the end.

With camp sorted and a rendezvous point organized we set about the important business of drinking cider and getting acquainted with our new home for the next five days.



Glastonbury is *huge*. Staggeringly so. Getting from stage to stage, no matter how close, takes time. A lot of time. A degree of planning and coordination is required for any group to maintain sanity and geniality. We were lucky with our choice of festival partners, if I could describe Scott as Obi Wan, then I would have been his young Padawan learner. The force was strong with this one.

Bad analogies aside, there is a buzz in the air that I imagine only happens at Glastonbury. There's such a broad range of people. music lovers from all walks of life. There are babies (accompanied of course), young families with kids in little trollies being pulled through the mud, excited teens, pensioners, locals, proper locals and then all us Londoners and big city types.

I saw no fighting, no aggression, no ill-will toward anyone anywhere the whole time. As packed as the

Adele or Coldplay gigs were, there was no sense of nervous energy - just a lovely buzz that only happens at a music festival of this kind of scale.

Then there was the music. We enjoyed some really great bands: Vaults, The Syrian Orchestra, Gregory Porter and Of Monsters and Men to name just a few.

The John Peel tent was a favourite for most of the weekend with its eclectic mix of performers

old and new but the overall energy and pace of everything really helped any sense of urgency slip

I can truly say it was a relaxing experience but never dull. I'm a convert now - I can't convert too many of the team here at Tried & True for fear of leaving the cafe understaffed and being unable to go, but I cannot recommend the festival enough. 
Putney Velodrome 1891-1905 A Well-kept Secret

Opposite Tried and True, behind the flats and across the railway line, Putney Velodrome, the first concrete cycling track in England, opened in 1891 with 12 tennis courts, a bowling green and a quoits pitch.

The cycle and athletics track ran down Landford Road, turned left into Earldom Road and left into Hotham and left into Erpingham Road. The entrance to the ground was in Clarendon Drive - now Nos. 70A and 68A. Putney station gave easy access to Putney and spectators flocked from far and near.

The Velodrome's 12 and 24hour races attracted as many as 10,000 spectators. But more significantly, the vast improvement in cycle technology prompted a craze for cycling that can only be described as fanatical - both for sport and for leisure pursuits. From 1840 inventors worked to develop a machine that would make society independent of the horse - hobby-horses, celeripedes, curricles, pedemotive carriages, velociferes, dandy-horses, celeromanes, aellopodes, boneshakers and, finally, the bicycle -'machines that would eat neither hay nor oats'. The Scientific American had a

headline in 1902: 'Walking is on its last legs.' HG Wells featured cycling in one of his novels, where the upper-class lady and her working-class beau cycle off, up Putney Hill.

Photographs and sketches of the track give the impression of a neat, well-laid out ground with a rather smart grandstand which gave the higher-paying spectators a comfortable seat and protection from the elements.

Distance walking was also a feature of the programme. On

23 October 1897 Bill Sturges set world walking records for 12 miles and 13 miles Then in 1905 Jack Butler set new walking records for all distance from 22 miles to 50 miles. It was not just the Boat Race that promoted the reputation of Putney in the 1900s.

Sadly the lease ran out in 1905 and by 1907 an enclave of Edwardian middle-class housing was on the market. Putney Velodrome faded fast from the memory.

School of Rock (& Roll)

A lot of cool stuff goes on in Putney and we're fortunate to get wind of it through our lovely guests. This month Rob meets **Richard Coulson** who runs a fun summer time programme for musical youngsters. We catch up over coffee at T&T

As most of you know, I dabble about on the guitar and love to listen to music and see as many of the world class artists that perform in our amazing city as possible.

That's why I was really excited to meet Richard Coulson who runs, along with a group of professional musicians, Rock & Roll Recruits – an innovative music programme for musical youngsters to "I loved my time there, it was the first time I was able to focus on music 100% of the time and I couldn't get enough".

Early Days

Richard's love of music started at age 6 when he picked up the flute at primary school using the Suzuki method.

"It's a great system as it really enhances ear training without soon enough Richard started a stripped down band with just piano and drums with old school buddy Greg.

"We set the scene for bands like the White Stripes" Richard laughs.

As luck would have it Greg's dad, Nige, played in a Rock & Roll band and introduced the pair to Rock & Roll, "Proper 50s music". The boys were hooked on Jerry Lee Lewis, Elvis, and Buddy Holly.

Meet Richard

Richard (35) is originally from Kenilworth in the midlands. He now lives in Wandsworth with his girlfriend. They are expecting their first baby in November.

Richard's London story begins in October 2001 when he moved to the big smoke to study music at what is now known as the London College of Music, part of University of West London.



relying too much on reading music or distracting theory...it's also a lot of fun!"

Having caught the bug, Richard nagged his folks for a keyboard for Christmas when he was eight years old.

"I got one! I taught myself songs I heard on the TV by ear, I learned La Bamba by Ritchie Valens. My parents then encouraged me to take piano lessons. Piano was my focus from 9-19 years old"

One thing led to another and

Richard's played music in bands ever since and is blessed to have made live performance a full time job.

Rock & Roll Recruits

Rock & Roll Recruits was founded in 2013 Richard and Alex Haynes. The two hit it off over their mutual love of Rock & Roll and have been playing together for almost 10 years.

The pair have designed the programme to bestow the benefits of music to young people. Especially building confidence and communication skills.

Music helped to build Richard's confidence when younger and he really enjoyed the challenge of having to get up and perform in front of people

"What I enjoy most about music, and always have, is the feeling you get... especially when you play with other people. When you are locked into a groove, you can totally lose yourself and express a lot, even instrumentally".

It's a big challenge to organise and run Rock & Roll Recruits but Richard and Alex clearly get a big kick out of it.

"With up to three groups rehearsing most weeks there is a lot of noise, paperwork and equipment to coordinate but it's totally worth it...

Watching each group take shape during the week is great feeling.

Not just musically, but socially too. You can see the kids make new friends and go from being very shy to really confident, and then perform a great show in front a packed venue by the end of week".

All the tutors take real pride in musical direction of each group. The live show at the end of the week often leaves parents and family astonished by the quality of the performance.

It certainly sounds like the popular programme will continue to develop more and more top young Putney musicians.

Rock & Roll Recruits are currently working alongside 'Achieving for Children' and offer a combination of courses to cover the skills section of the Duke of Edinburgh's Award. They are also starting a residential DofE course next summer for 16-18 year olds.

If that wasn't enough, Rock & Roll Recruits also run children's Friday night groups at Ritz Music & Tuition Centre in Richmond

where the project began with the support of owner Simon Taylor back in 2013.

For the grown ups

The fun isn't just restricted to the young ones either:

"Due to many parents enjoying our shows, I was asked to start an adult group in October last year. This is held on Mondays, at Ritz, and we are working towards a gig at The Half Moon in Putney on 24thSeptember. Do come along!"

Relaxing

When Richard isn't hard at work he enjoys relaxing at T&T with pulled pork and poached eggs on brioche, occasionally a sausage sandwich. And coffee?

"I always used to have a latte, but now it's a double macchiato. Maybe I need the stronger boost these days, possibly two when the baby comes along!"

When not practicing, gigging or working with the Rock & Roll Recruits Richard enjoys the simple things, friends, BBQs and gigs with the occasional stroll through Richmond Park or along the Thames. **RK**

FEED THE COOKIE MONSTERS!

Kids off for school holidays? World getting you down? Need a bit of cheering up?

Everyone knows the therapeutic benefits of baking fresh homemade cookies. Not only do they taste better and you know exactly what's in them, there is nothing better than enjoying a chocolate chip cookie fresh out of the oven. Especially if there is someone you can share it with!

Here's a classic Chocolate Chip Cookie recipe that I often make with Clara. Usually I make half the recipe as I can't trust myself when there are fresh cookies around!

Make sure you've got friends coming round or a play date on the horizon before even thinking about making these!





MAKES 4 DOZEN

225 g unsalted butter (room temperature)

1 cup light brown sugar

0.75 cup granulated sugar

2 large eggs

1t vanilla extract

2 cups plain flour

0.75 t baking soda

1 t salt

2 Cups semi-sweet chocolate chips

Optional 1-2 cups chopped walnuts

- 1. Preheat oven to 180C and grease a cookie sheet lightly
- 2. Cream butter and sugars together until light and fluffy. Add eggs and vanilla, being careful not to overbeat
- 3. Sift in dry ingredients and mix well. Stir in chips and, if desired, nuts.
 - 4. Drop large tablespoons of dough onto cookie sheet.
- 5. Bake for 12 minutes or until the cookies are brown at the edge but soft in the middle.

This month's seasonal espresso







Our current seasonal espresso blend from Square Mile Coffee Roasters is composed of 2 different lots of coffee from 2 origins. The current components of the espresso are: 60% Rabanales (Guatamala)/40% Montanas del Diamante (Costa Rica).

The welcome return of 2 old favourites as the Guatemalan and Costa Rican season begins.

Hazelnuts and cherries abound from the Rabanales whereas the Montanas has a warming chocolate ganache quality to it, when combined they make for a sweet and pleasing espresso.


During the high Middle Ages, there was, on average, a church for every 200 people. The word "assassination" was invented by Shakespeare.
